Outstanding 2004 results for ARC

Mitcheldean's Asset Recycling Centre finished 2004 with a zero outstanding orderbook and full year profit of over \$9 million (Manufacturing Cost Variance - MCV). This is a truly outstanding achievement by everyone given the significant volume changes we witnessed throughout the year.

We shipped in excess of 7,200 Silverstone units, but a 2,000 volume reduction in Q4 meant we finished with higher than planned inventory levels. We will now burn off this excess through the first part of 2005. General business results in all four operational areas of Equipment Remanufacture, ROS Repair, UK Serviced Equipment and Asset Strip showed gains on the previous year, especially in terms of quality and productivity.

On the 'people front', Period 12 absence was again well under the planned level, and resulted in a total of 1.9 per cent for the complete year - an excellent result, and for four months during 2004 we achieved less than 1.0 per cent.

Our safety record was again very strong, although we did suffer one accident in Q3. We have recovered from this and finished the year with another very good quarter. We must all endeavour to keep this record intact as we move through 2005. Our target again will be zero accidents.

I would especially like to take this opportunity to thank each and every member of the ARC team who together achieved these outstanding business results. I hope you all had a very good and restful Christmas and I wish you all a very happy and healthy 2005.

Xerox aids tsunami disaster areas

Xerox has pledged over \$1 million to help the people of Asia to cope with the Tsunami disaster. Many of you have already contributed. 
\$250,000 will be allocated at a later date to respond to any unforeseen needs that arise as the reclamation efforts begin to take effect.

Four years' safety achievement by FBC



February 2005 saw a really significant event for Mitcheldean's Fuser Business Centre (FBC); the completion of four years without a safety incident.

This excellent performance was recognised by John Laing, Xerox Corporation SDU manager in Rochester, New York, who said. "Congratulations on a long period of zero injury. It certainly hasn't been by accident, and I commend you for your accomplishment. Keep up the great work.'

FBC manager at Mitcheldean, Chris Clarke, feels that above all, this is an achievement for the entire workforce in FBC. "This achievement must be attributed to the care and dedication of whole of the Mitcheldean FBC team" he said. "I have only two wishes, that everyone recognises their own achievement, and that they don't rest on their very well deserved laurels. Continuing safety at work is achieved by long term commitment to all the basic

principles of good safety practice." Mark Barnard, HR manager for FBC, noted that: "The relatively 'heavy' manufacturing processes in Fusers all have their own inherent risks, which makes the individual safety performances all the more creditable.

"We can only continue to achieve these performances by individual, unrelenting effort within a safety-conscious work team." said Dave Bufton, Environmental Health & Safety manager at Mitcheldean. "Of course, we rely upon a 360° assessment as our starting point, covering equipment, processes, management systems and maintenance. This, in turn, allows us to understand what we are asking of our workforce. We can then identify and implement safe methods of working."

Chris Clarke concluded, "Well done everyone. Don't let your guard drop, and remember: Never allow yourself to become complacent; always make your first thought 'Safety'."

Chance takers accident makers

We've all done it, left electrical tools out in the rain, left a fire door open, or lifted a heavy item without bending our knees. Most of the time we've been lucky, but sometimes our luck doesn't hold and our risk-taking is suddenly the subject of bitter regret, even weeks of pain, or real serious injury to someone else.

Just don't take unnecessary risks, whether at home, in the workplace, or at leisure. Think before you act. Stop and consider the possible consequences before you take a short cut. Make sure that whatever you're doing is safe. Risk-takers can be accident makers. Always think SAFETY!





Wash those costs right out!

Following a review of aqueous waste, an FBC team redesigned the roll washing process in the Viton plant, to realise water savings (and thus aqueous waste savings) of more than 36,000 litres of water in a three-month period, to produce annual savings valued at more than \$60,000.

The project was initiated in February 2004 following a review, carried out by the FBC Environmental Resources Team, of energy and resources use.

Following the review, which highlighted possible savings, a Lean Six Sigma Team, including production engineering, laboratory services and the EH&S Team, identified all sources of special waste.

It was established that certain colour rolls did not need a wash process. A robot was then commissioned by October 2004 to sort and divert colour rolls to a different bypass route through the Viton coating operation.

This meant that more than 2,500 rolls per month did not pass through the water wash process, avoiding both the costs of water and the costs of disposal.

Ashley Meek ... big fish in the Forest!

FBC's Ashley Meek, who is a First Aider and "Landing the fish was a major challenge," said works on the Viton line, has become a 'minor media star' since he caught a 36lb pike in the River Wye in February.

Ashley goes fishing with his 'piking partner' Lyndon Brain, also from FBC. Ashley's recordbreaking exploit has led to news reports in the News of the World, Anglers Times, Midland Angler and Anglers Mail. Such is the interest in this huge fish that there are likely to be more news reports!

Ashley. Lyndon only just won the struggle to fit the 4-foot pike into the landing net. I was really pleased we achieved it, my fishing rod nearly bent double at one stage when I was pulling at fish and water flow together!"

The big pike won Ashley a number of cash prizes, as well as fishing kit and visits to exhibitions at the NEC to celebrate his achievement ... and by the way, the pike lived to fight another day!




LSA Dinner - 6th May at the Chase Hotel, Ross-on-Wye

Another Xerox Earth Award for FBC

Environmental responsibility often goes hand in hand with profitable, efficient production, so it was very good to win yet another Xerox Earth Award for FBC. The latest Earth Award was given to FBC's which reviewed energy and resources use within FBC at Mitcheldean.

Working with FBC's production engineers' Lean of environmental impact control and related Six Sigma team and Laboratory Services (for chemical analysis), the team, identified process water savings (and thus aqueous waste saving) for the roll washing process within the Viton plant. This was achieved by using an automatic robot colour roll bypass system built by Peter Tuckett (described in the last issue).

The first phase, installed in October 2004, has already paid for itself and generated annual savings valued at \$60,000.

"It's another tribute to the hard work of our FBC Environmental Resource management team, people," said Chris Clarke. "While we recognise our critical role in producing key Xerox components, we also have to work hard to meet all our standards for ISO 14001 in terms activity. The most important aspect of this Earth Award is that it recognises a process change that both improves profitability and benefits our local environmental measures.

Successful OHSAS assessment - 'a well maintained system'

The first OHSAS 18001 safety assessment audit was successfully completed on 16th May. The assessor from BSI (British Standards Institution), Alan Hughes, commented that there was "Overall good evidence to show that the system has been well maintained and managed conscientiously".

"My thanks for this good result go to everyone at Mitcheldean," commented EHS manager Dave Bufton. "Of course, the OHSAS 18001 standard and the Mitcheldean Health & Safety Management system provide the framework, but it is everyone's conscientious attention to detail, no matter how onerous, that maintains our personal safety, and we all value it highly."

The review covered an accident-free period, with two First Aider incidents and two 'near misses', and the assessor commented upon a good 2004 result and effective objectives in place for 2005.

However, three key issues were identified for urgent action: machine guarding, risk assessment for forklift trucks and contractor documentation. We tend to forget the safety value of guards on moving machinery, and that they not only guard against operator mistakes, but also must guard against other events. Any passer-by can slip, trip or fall, and this means

So we all have to be aware of the risks of moving machinery, and especially vigilant to the risks posed to everyone.

Next time you are in any manufacturing area or office, watch out for moving machines, and report any safety risks related to:

TRAPS - moving parts that could draw in and trap the operator OR other people.

IMPACT - moving parts that could hit the operator OR other people.

CONTACT - moving or stationary parts that are hot, cold, abrasive or electrically 'live'.

ENTANGLEMENT - of clothing, hair, ties in moving parts.

EJECTION - machine component or material thrown out by the machine.

And those of you who never leave the office, remember, ties and long hair can be caught in shredders. Trolleys, even file trolleys, can damage feet to the point where surgery can be required. Poor wiring or plugs, and irregular guards have to be in place to eliminate any risk. maintenance can all result in electrical hazards. Don't forget:

Ensure eternal vigilance, and NEVER remove or bypass guards, protective structures and safety systems.

The sad fact is that more accidents happen at home than at work, but they are just as painful, just as costly, and just as inconvenient as accidents in the workplace. It really makes no difference to you personally where the accident happens; the costs can still be massive.

HOUSEKEEPING AND PLANNED INSPECTION

AND REMEMBER, SAFETY STARTS AT HOME...SO TAKE IT TO THE OFFICE!

Our aim at Mitcheldean remains 'zero accidents'. The benefits from this policy are just as much for the individual as for the business.

A high proportion of accidents are from slips and falls, so please ensure that all gangways are kept clear of all obstacles This doesn't mean just boxes or litter, but ANY obstacle. A trip over someone else's inconsiderate feet may injure two people at the same time! Never leave any spills on the floor, clear them up immediately, before they cause a nasty injury. No matter how relaxed you are, don't slip your shoes off! Unprotected toes are a major hazard. Your toes are key to your balance, standing and walking

Remember that paper is a heavy commodity, and filing cabinets can inflict considerable damage if they tip. Always ensure that no more than one drawer is open at a time.

Think safety at home, always, and bring that thought to work with you each day.

Xerox inventor honoured

Robert W. Gundlach, who retired from Xerox in 1995, was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in the US in May for his inventions that resulted in the modern photocopier. His inventions not only helped revolutionise the workplace, but also ultimately unlocked the basic workings of the process used in products that turn out millions of colour and black-andwhite copies and prints in homes, offices and print shops around the world.

Gundlach, 78, is among six living inventors cited by the Hall of Fame for accomplishments "that have bettered our quality of life and allowed us greater convenience and safety." The Hall of Fame is giving posthumous recognition to eight additional inventors


"As one of the first research scientists hired by the Haloid Company, now known as Xerox Corporation, Gundlach was responsible for finding ways to refine and improve xerography," according to the Hall of Fame. "Through Gundlach's work, photocopying became a practical reality."

30% improvement by 2012

Xerox has pledged to cut greenhouse gas emissions from its worldwide operations by 10 per cent from the baseline year 2002 to the end of 2012.

This aggressive voluntary reduction target is aligned with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Climate Leaders programme and The Business Roundtable's Climate RESOLVE programme, which Xerox joined in 2003. And it complements the company's ongoing environmental programmes, which include products designed for energy efficiency and innovative remanufacturing and recycling practices.

"While the absolute reduction in greenhouse gas emissions will be a challenge - requiring a 30 per cent or more improvement in energy efficiency compared with 2002 levels - it is the right thing for Xerox to do," said Anne M. Mulcahy, Xerox chairman and chief executive officer. "As energy and fuel costs rise, consciously working to further control Xerox's energy-related costs is environmentally responsible and financially smart."





Don't take silly risks



We've all been there A quick dash across the road, standing on a handy upturned bucket, or not asking someone to secure a ladder while we paint that gutter.

Often the chances of injury compared with embarrassment or a near miss are small, but the fact remains that many serious accidents are primarily the result of risky behaviour. You know the safety rules, you know what to do, you know where the safety equipment is located, but you allow short term thinking, or even 'no thinking', to override common sense.

So next time you have a job or task that does entail a risk of injury, make sure you think first, and not when the accident is starting to happen. Just remember always ask the key question: Is it safe? It's been said before, observe the rules, use the correct equipment and, of course, make sure that your operating rule at home and at work is: If it's not safe, it's not an option!



Temporary solutions, permanent tragedies

Sticking plaster, string and sealing wax, not to mention masking tape, all provide quick solutions but unless used for their correct purpose they can be one of the factors that contribute to an accident. There is only one safe rule with defective equipment: don't use it until you are sure it is safe to do so, or it has been replaced by a new or fully refurbished item.



The temptation to adopt temporary solutions is always one step closer to an unacceptable risk. Don't even think about temporary solutions when safety is the issue.

ALWAYS, if you are using safety equipment, and this includes ladders, eye and feet protection, machine guards and fire doors, ensure that any certificates are valid, and that the item is checked regularly. If it's something you wear, such as safety glasses or head, foot or hand protection, then a daily check should be the minimum. If it is damaged or inoperable don't attempt any repairs yourself. Get your kit checked by a safety professional, and if in doubt discard the kit and get a replacement.

If you are ever in a situation where an essential repair is carried out on the spot, always ensure that it is checked by a competent third party who has safety responsibilities.

In the end, everyone is responsible for their own safety, and ultimately the safety of their colleagues. So if you are ever tempted to adopt a makeshift repair for a safety critical item, remember, temporary set-ups can cause permanent tragedies.

This enabled process times to be shortened, internal movement with the process to be minimised, and waste materials and avoidable time delays to be reduced. Richard also worked closely during the project with Tim Tarby-Donald in Global Purchasing, who is a current black belt candidate.

John Gwilt commented, "Above all this was a team achievement. As always, the key to improved results is team motivation. Richard not only planned the project well, but he also

Xerox second quarter earnings

Xerox reports second-quarter earnings of 40 cents per share.

- 20 cents adjusted EPS excludes tax settlement and restructuring
- Total revenue up 2 per cent
- Equipment sales up 4 per cent
- Revenue from colour up 17 per cent
- \$290 million operating cash flow

At the end of July Xerox announced secondquarter earnings per share of 40 cents, including a 33 cents per share gain from a recent IRS tax settlement, which was partially offset by restructuring charges of 13 cents per share. Equipment sales in the second quarter increased 4 per cent year over year, and total revenue of \$3.9 billion increased 2 per cent. Both equipment sales and total revenue included a currency benefit of 2 percentage points. The overall post-sale trend improved as the revenue stream from new digital systems and services offset declines from the company's older light-lens technology.

"Xerox's investment in innovation strengthened top-line results in the second quarter with our industry-leading colour technology driving equipment sale growth," said Anne M. Mulcahy, Xerox chairman and chief executive officer.

Gross margin of 39 per cent was lower than expected. This was due to a change in product mix primarily due to increased sales activity for desktop office products as well as light production and colour systems.

"These equipment sales will drive future post-sale gains, and, at the same time, we're adjusting our business model to respond to the resulting pressure on margins," added Mulcahy. "We remain confident that these actions and increased sales of new technology - 25 new products launched in the second quarter - coupled with growth from Xerox Global Services provide the marketplace momentum for strong second-half performance."

In the second quarter, Xerox generated operating cash flow of \$290 million after contributing \$230 million to its primary U.S. pension plan. The company closed the quarter with a cash and shortterm investments balance of \$2.1 billion. Debt was down \$2.1 billion year over year and down \$1.5 billion from the first quarter of this year.

Xerox international survey reveals Italy values documents most!

Xerox has shown that there are as many international differences in the way businesses run their offices as there are in the way people dress, the food they eat, or the local customs they observe.

A study of 1,236 companies from across Europe has found that the equipment companies use, the way they buy it, and their attitudes to how they operate it, differ widely from one country to the next. Differences are especially marked between northern and southern Europe.

For instance, the study found that the Italians appear to value the importance of documents the most of any country in Europe. A total of 95 per cent of all Italian companies carefully measure the cost of the initial purchase price of a Document Output Device (DOD), while, on the other end of the scale, only three-quarters of German companies (74 per cent) take time to do the same.

A straight back helps transmit the lifting force to your strong thigh muscles and avoids excessive spinal flexing under load, so always try to ensure you keep your back straight.

3. Look!

If you move with the load, ensure you can see above it. Always ensure that the carrying route is free from any constrictions or obstacles.

Trips are bad enough; if you are still holding the load they can be really serious.

4. Don't twist.

Don't turn your body when lifting or holding the load, move your feet first.

5. Strength is in the legs.

Your legs, and especially your thigh muscles, are the movers when it comes to lifting. Load and unload actions should be driven by the legs. Bend your knees and let your legs do the work.

6. Slide loads if you can.

Don't try to be too accurate when unloading. Slide loads into the final position if you can. This also helps protect fingers in confined spaces.

Don't forget!

It's easy to underestimate weights and shapes. Always get help if you think a load may be too heavy or bulky. Remember, backs need care at home too. Lifting children or pets can be just as risky as lifting big boxes. So always think before you lift.

One final thought!

Fit backs need fit muscles, especially stomach and thigh muscles. If you keep fit to maintain the fitness of those muscles you will also be helping your back to meet all the loads imposed upon it.

Quality Assurance, and Paul Dummett, Annie Kear and Paul Morse have already joined Production.



Stop that noise! it's a real safety issue


The FBC EHS team is running an awareness and noisesampling project to work towards reducing noise in the work place, as part of the Xerox contribution to European Stop that Noise Week.

Every day, millions of employees in Europe are exposed to noise at work and all the risks this can entail. While noise is obviously a problem in manufacturing environments, it can also pressure, work-related stress, and be an issue in a wide range of other environments, including offices, restaurants and other supposedly 'quiet' environments.

One in five European workers has to raise their voices to be heard for at least half of the time that they are at work and 7 per cent suffer from work-related hearing difficulties. Noise-induced hearing loss is the most common reported occupational disease in the EU.

Exposure to noise may pose a variety of health and safety risks to workers including hearing loss, physiological effects such as an increase in blood increased risk of accidents.

"This is an important project" commented Dave Bufton, "while we take great care to minimize exposure to noise it is important that we check our compliance and obtain feedback from all staff to help us achieve our objectives in this area. Please help us to ensure that noise hazards are correctly spotted and workable solutions implemented."



Xerox reports third quarter earnings of 5 cents per share

Xerox Corporation announced on 21st October third quarter earnings per share of 5 cents. This includes previously announced charges of 12 cents per share related to litigation matters and other items as well as a restructuring charge of 1 cent per share. Excluding these items. Xerox delivered adjusted earnings per share of 18 cents. Xerox also announced plans to repurchase up to \$500 million of the company's common stock.

"We met expectations by delivering another quarter of positive performance with revenue growth and earnings expansion," said Anne M Mulcahy, Xerox chairman & chief executive officer. "Xerox's third quarter results reflect the strength of our digital portfolio, especially in colour, where our industry-leading technology delivered 22 per cent revenue growth," she added, citing strong sales of the company's DocuColor™ multifunction devices and iGen3™ Production Press.

"These digital systems, combined with document management services, flow through to boost our annuity revenue, continuing a positive trend that fuels total revenue growthand the strategy is working.

"As important, the strength of our financial position gives us flexibility to compete effectively, invest in innovation and deliver a return to shareholders through initiatives like the share repurchase programme."

In the third quarter, total revenue of \$3.8 billion grew 1 per cent year over year. Equipment sales increased 2 per cent. Post-sale and financing revenue, which represents more than 70 per cent of the company's total revenue, grew 1 per cent as the revenue stream from digital products offset declines from the company's older light lens technology.

Beware!! The iceman cometh!

Our December snow and ice warning was a little late this year. Since the last Mitch in November we have seen blizzards in Cornwall, and ice storms in the Cotswolds, not to mention some very treacherous Forest roads. Make sure you follow the 'snow procedure', issued last week, and take sensible precautions driving or walking to ensure that you enjoy the coming break!

The three priorities for safe driving in these conditions remain the same, but the most important is 'Take your time', always a good mantra for drivers, but critical in icy conditions.

Stopping distances increase greatly as soon as icy surfaces are present. The slower you go, the easier it is to stop. Go slower, and increase your normal safety distance between you and the driver in front.

Visibility is also important. See and be seen. Remove ice and snow from windows and lights before you drive, and don't forget internal mist and condensation are still hazards. Use an anti-mist wipe to keep your windows clear inside and outside.

Once you are moving the best safety aid is to drive smoothly and slowly. Harsh braking, sharp movements of the steering wheel, or heavy acceleration, all cause tyres to lose grip. Once you've lost the traction you've lost the plot, so take it gently.



Remove all snow and ice from windows and lights.



Drive carefully Smooth & slow on ice and snow

are walking . Wear proper footwear & take smaller steps.

Traction is equally important on foot. Look for icy patches or other obstacles to progress. One slip can do real damage, so wear shoes or boots with ridged soles to maximise grip, and take smaller steps to maintain balance. Wrap up warm, and enjoy the break!

Award for personal protection

Fuser Business Centre (FBC) has received a Xerox Safety Award for improving the personal protection for its staff. As part of the Mitcheldean 'Zero Injury' programme, the FBC facility care team identified Personal Protective Equipment as an action to meet its 2005 objectives. The review covered the PPE requirement, effectiveness, actual provision and use.

A team was formed by FBC, including Andy Gibbs, Andy Billingham, John Davies, Greg Stafford, Steve Hodder, Keith Buffrey, Neil Buffrey and Dave Bufton.

This involvement by the safety representatives was a key contribution to the success of the project. The team checked equipment, tools and processes to meet identified personal protective equipment requirements. The current provisions were then analysed by the Laboratory Service Contractors (Neil and Keith Buffrey), and a set of corrective actions was identified, then implemented.

"This work provided our workforce with improved protection, for example, by checking that where used, face masks fitted properly." said FBC manager Chris Clarke, and heightened awareness across the entire FBC team.

"All in all, it was an excellent learning experience. It enabled our safety training to be improved, so that we could overcome previously unidentified weaknesses in the safety system and subsequently achieve higher levels of safety."
