

Monday, APRIL 22nd

Walking tour of "London's historic curiosities" and visit to Bank of England

See London's oldest parish church, investigate Roman remains, stand on the sites of bloody executions ... all this and more on this two-hour walk around some of London's lesser-known curiosities. Tuesday, JUNE 11th

Slimbridge Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust and Berkeley Castle

After lunch, we shall travel the few miles to Berkeley Castle, a well-preserved Norman fortress on the Severn estuary, which has been transformed over the years into a truly stately home with a wealth of treasures.

Monday, JUNE 17th

Sandringham House, Kings Lynn

This well-loved royal family home is now owned by the Queen and all the main rooms used by the Royal Family are open to the public. There is also a museum containing fascinating displays of royal memorabilia and the sixty acres of glorious grounds provide a wonderful setting.

Our visit will include lunch and afternoon tea and coach transport will be arranged where numbers are sufficient. Unfortunately, we are unable to offer this visit to members at Mitcheldean as, in the opinion of Cotterells Coaches, the long journey would not leave enough time to view the house.

Expression of Wish Form

If you receive a pension from Rank Xerox in your own right (i.e. it is not a widow's, widower's or dependant's pension), it is important for us to have an up-to-date Expression of Wish Form from you on file. If there are benefits payable when you die, the Form will then help the Trustee Directors establish who the beneficiaries should be.

So, if your personal circumstances have changed at all since you last completed a Form, give Rank Xerox Pensions a call or drop them a line and they will pop a Form in the post for you.

PENSION PAY DATES

Your pension will be paid into your bank account as follows:

May pension	1st May
June pension	31st May
July pension	1st July
August pension	1st August

CHARITY DONATION

1996 RANK XEROX PENSIONS INCREASE

The Trustee Directors have agreed a 3.2% increase to pensions in payment and deferred pensions, with effect from 1st April. The increase applies to pensions in excess of the Guaranteed Minimum Pension (as explained on page 7 of the last Newsletter).

If you have retired since April 1995, you will receive a pro-rated increase based on the number of months you have been paid by Rank Xerox Pensions payroll.

"Barrie joined Rank Xerox in 1965 and was one of the first mobile engineers on the old Molton bicycle. He was immediately recognisable when entering the local store

wearing his double-breasted suit and bicycle clips. I think he sometimes carried more spare

> parts than an automobile engineer, his carriers often being loaded to danger point.

"In the 1980's, Barrie left the United Kingdom to join Rank Xerox in France. I'm not sure whether this was because he was on the run from his Manager but he was a great success there because he was fluent in French!

"Barrie, if you are looking down, thanks for the pleasure of sharing your life with us and our deepest condolences to your family."

Reg Caldicutt

We are sad to report the death, peacefully at home, of a well-known Mitcheldean pensioner, Reg Caldicutt. Reg

joined Rank Xerox in 1964 and worked as an assembler on the 813 model before moving on to the 914/720 products.

Reg had been a regular soldier with the Worcestershire Regiment and served at El Alamein and in Palestine; for a short period in the desert, he chauffeured Field-Marshall Montgomery.

Reg was a St. John's Ambulance man, who represented that organisation at the wedding of Princess Anne and who was a first aider for Rank Xerox during his working life. His interests included ballroom dancing, for which he had won numerous prizes, and playing the piano and electric organ.

Reg is survived by his widow, Gwen, who was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1983 for services to the community.

Xerox has signed on with the International Olympic Committees as a "Top III Sponsor", the most exclusive sponsorship category. Xerox's involvement with the Olympics dates back to 1964 and over the years the Company's technology has been harnessed to make the Games run as smoothly and efficiently as possible.

As recently as 1984, the results were copied and placed by hand in the thousands of pigeonholes at each Olympic venue by 2,000 volunteers! Compare this with Atlanta in 1996 where, for the first time in Olympic history, the

media will be obtaining results within minutes, thanks to Xerox's high-speed network DocuPrint 390 Highlight Colour laser printers.

In view of Xerox's involvement with the 1996 Games, the Company's "theme" this year is "A time to win", focussing on revenue growth and customer and productivity imperatives.



DCS 35 – ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION

"We think that Xerox Document Centre Systems will change the way people in the office think about their documents and change the way people in the office think about Xerox", said **Paul Allaire**, Xerox Chairman at the recent New York launch of the new Document Centre System 35 (DCS 35).

And he was right ... the DCS 35 and a smaller version, the DCS 20, have met with a very favourable response both from the stock market and the business press. Designed as both a network system and a walk-up device, the multi-functional Document Centre System offers standard document features, such as printing, finishing, copying and faxing, as well as an array of advanced document services. And the whole system can be managed from the desktop.

The creation of the new product range has been very much a joint effort. Design and development of the DCS 35 was managed by Xerox in Rochester; Welwyn Garden City was responsible for design of the Image Output Terminal (IOT); and Printing Systems Focussed factory at Mitcheldean (shown in the photograph) are building the machines destined for the European market as well as manufacturing the IOTs for systems which are integrated in Webster.



MEETING THE CHALLENGE OF 1997

Raghunandan Sachdev, recently-appointed Managing Director of Xerox China/Hong Kong (XCHK), has the job of transforming two hitherto remote and small Xerox operations in Hong Kong and China into a single integrated business. The new enterprise must be robust enough to meet the challenges and opportunities of 1997, when Hong Kong reverts to Chinese ownership.

Although receiving strategy from Xerox Corporation, XCHK is now part of the Rank Xerox stable, so that it can benefit from that Company's expertise in operational and international management. That expertise will be needed to help reconstruct the Hong Kong company into a model Customer Business Unit (CBU), still based in Hong Kong but responsible also for China. The intention eventually is to integrate the Hong Kong CBU with China, where 7-9 more CBUs will be established.

As the first step towards this, Xerox successfully negotiated with the Chinese Government last year to create Xerox (China) Limited, now also headed by Sachdev. This is a wholly foreign-owned company and will enable Xerox to trade in its own right instead of through joint ventures as at present, thereby giving it direct access to customers.

No-one doubts that the China operation has the potential to become a major player within Xerox following the integration and expansion, which should create a dynamic business for 1997 and beyond.

TO THE RESCUE!

Last year **Geoff Taylor** and his wife, **Marion**, spent six months cruising the French canals in their 26 foot yacht. The idea for the holiday came when Geoff took early retirement from his job as a Field Supervisor in the Channel Islands; it proved to be not only enjoyable but also exciting, as Geoff recounts.



"Before leaving Guernsey, I had attended a first aid course to help us with any medical emergency we might encounter ... which we did while relaxing on the boat in a village in central France. Members organise their own groups of 10-20, drawing on each other's skills, sharing knowledge and experience, and developing individual capability in a pleasurable and relaxed environment".

Branches selected their six biggest customers for the IMO (Initial Machine Observation for those non-sales people!). In the North, customers like Unilever, Plessey, ICI and Liverpool University were given a three-month free trial to evaluate the machine's performance and reliability; a similar procedure was used in the South.

A target for installations was set at four machines a month but the 9200 proved so popular that, within three months, there were more orders than machines!

Healthwise

EAT MORE FIBRE!

Dr. Terry Burgess explains how eating more fibre could help prevent many "Western" diseases.

For once, healthy eating does not mean eating less ... as far as fibre is concerned, this is something we should be eating more of! A diet without fibre or roughage gives little work for the intestines to do.

In the past 30 years, knowledge of dietary fibre has changed our thinking about many diseases. Fibre is important in

the prevention of many "Western" diseases such as constipation, piles, gallstones, diverticulitis, bowel cancer and coronary heart disease.

It seems that our daily average consumption of fibre in this country is 20 grams. If this figure could be increased to 30-50 grams, we would all be healthier. Vegetarians have always seemed a healthy group and this could be because they tend to eat more fibre.


Fibre is contained in the external covering of foods and especially in the husks of cereals, rice, fruit and potato skins. In itself fibre contains no vitamins or minerals and cannot increase one's weight. It is inert but the bulk it produces in our digestive tract is an important factor in maintaining good health.

Fibre from cereals and rice is mainly of the *insoluble* type. This

absorbs water, increases in bulk and assists in the passage of foods through the body.

Additionally it helps to remove toxic substances. *Soluble*

fibre, which is high in fruits, vegetables and pulses, forms a gel inside the body which delays the take-up of sugars and binds with some forms of cholesterol.



How to consume more fibre

Foods differ in their fibre content, with bran being the richest source. Bran is formed from the husks of wheat grain stripped off in the milling process which produces white flour. If you

are convinced of the benefits of a high-fibre diet, then most of your daily requirement can be met by one heaped tablespoon of bran.

It is probably better though to get your fibre by eating other foods which have a high fibre content but which also provide other nutrients lacking in bran. Don't forget that the benefits of fibre are not lost in cooking. A practical guideline is for each adult to try to eat at least 30 grams of fibre a day from rich sources like the following:

Some older people who were treated for colitis or spastic colon some years ago may now feel confused. Until some 20 years ago, the medical treatment was a low-residue diet; now it's the opposite - a high-fibre diet - that's usually recommended. So cheers all round ... here is something you don't have to cut down on!

SOUND MIND, SOUND BODY

A 12-year study of over 6,000 older people has found that those who remain physically active are more likely to retain their mental fitness as well! The Manchester University survey, which compared veteran athletes and non-athletes, found that the former had better scores on memory, decision-making, reaction times and problemsolving. Regular exercise ensures that the lungs and heart remain capable of delivering enough oxygen or nutrients to the brain.

Any form of aerobic exercise can help - brisk walking, running, cycling, swimming or dancing. So if you already exercise, keep it up! If you don't, then why not start?

Moneywise

Jack Bonney, our Taxation and State Benefits specialist, reminds us of the main items of interest to pensioners in the Chancellor's November 1995 Budget, which are due to come into effect from 6th April 1996.



INCOME TAX

▼ Tax allowances are raised, most by slightly more than the rate of inflation and personal allowances by 1¹/2 times that rate. The new allowances are:

- ▼ The income limit for age-related allowances is increased from £14,600 to £15,200. This means that those over 65 can now have an additional £600 of income before their extra allowances are reduced.
- ▼ The bands of taxable income are to be adjusted so that the lower rate (20%) will be extended to the first £3,900 of taxable income and the higher rate (40%) will not be charged until taxable income exceeds £25,500. The middle band (£3,901 £25,500) will be liable to tax at the basic rate.
- ▼ The basic rate is reduced from 25% to 24%. This will benefit most tax payers, although pensioners with Home Income Loans will be slightly worse off, as they will now deduct only 24% from their interest payments instead of 25%.

SAVINGS

▼ The tax rate on savings income is cut from 25% to 20%. This applies to interest from banks, building societies, unit trusts, gilts, corporate bonds and purchased life annuities. Non-tax payers will still be able to re-claim any such tax deducted at source or to register for the interest to be paid gross. Higher rate tax

payers will now have to pay a "top-up" tax of 20% instead of the previous 15%.

This is a "windfall" to basic rate tax payers, although you will need savings of £30,000 to produce a net gain of £80 a year.

▼ The qualifying age for National Savings Fixed Rate Pensioner Bonds (7% gross for five years) is reduced from 65 to 60.

RESIDENTIAL CARE AND NURSING HOMES

■ Many pensioners, as they get older, have to enter residential care homes or nursing homes. Before the Budget, if they had savings in excess of £8,000, they got no State aid with the fees. If they had savings between £3,000 and £8,000, they got a reduced amount of State aid.

These limits were recognised to be too low and the Budget provides for changes. Now, the first £10,000 of savings will be ignored before any reduction in State aid is applied and savings of up to £16,000 will be allowed before State aid is totally cut off.

It is estimated that these changes will benefit some 50,000 pensioners in the first year.

▼ One of a couple who has to enter a residential care or nursing home is now allowed to keep 50% of any occupational pension when his/her contribution to the fees is assessed.

DSS BENEFITS

▼ Most contributory benefits are increased by 3.9% and most income-related benefits (e.g. Income Support) by 3%. New weekly rates for the principal benefits are:




