Throughout our visit, the fuss made of us by the Americans was overwhelming: "Thank you for coming"... "thank you for standing with us"... "let me buy you a drink" and so on.

Our tour began in the pretty resort of Hyannis on scenic Cape Cod. We had the opportunity to take the ferry across Nantucket Sound to quaint Martha's Vineyard and the more intrepid in our group weathered a force nine gale to experience a fascinating in-depth commentary by expert naturalists on a magnificent whale watch.

On day six, we travelled through the beautiful foliage of the Green Mountains to Stowe, a ski resort in Vermont. Vermont is the most rural state in the US, with its lush green mountains, glacial lakes and landscape of small villages and dairy farms. While there, we visited Woodstock and Billings Farm and Museum. We tasted maple sugar at The Morse Farm Sugar Works in Montpelier and had a fascinating day at the Shelburne Museum, seeing samples of Vermont handcrafts and New England artisans. Fortunately for us, there was a significant exhibition of paintings by the great 20th century artist, Grandma Moses, on display during our visit.


Pension Increase 2002

As we have had a number of queries about this year's pension increase, we thought it would be useful to explain how the process works.

Under the Rules of the Scheme, your Xerox pension is guaranteed to rise in line with the movement in the Retail Prices Index (RPI), up to a limit of 5% a year. The RPI is measured from December to December and is set by the Government, based on the cost of buying a range of goods and services – a future article will expand on this. The Trustees have no power to award an increase in excess of RPI.

If the increase in the RPI is 5% or less, it is automatically granted by the Trustees. The RPI increase as at December 2001 was 0.7% and this was implemented at 1st April 2002. If the RPI increase were to be larger than 5%, the Trustees would have discretion, if the Scheme could afford it, to award part or all of the excess. The record of the Scheme in this regard is one of the best in the country.

Pottering about in the Royal Forest of Dean

Wednesday 21st August

We will then travel on to Taurus Crafts for a **pottery** demonstration and afternoon tea. Our return journey will take us through Lydney where **Dennis Potter** met his wife in the Town Hall – also, the Beatles performed a concert there in 1962.

Portsmouth Wednesday 4th September

A visit to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard, 800 years in the making, is an experience like no other. We will be thrilled by the sight of Nelson's flagship, the majestic H.M.S. Victory, captivated by the remarkable story of Henry VIII's favourite ship, The Mary Rose, and excited by stepping aboard the pride of Queen Victoria's fleet, the mighty H.M.S. Warrior, 1860.

Our group ticket will entitle you to view any two of three attractions, including the Royal Naval Museum and Action Stations, where you can experience life aboard a Royal Navy Type 23 Frigate with the stunning large-format movie. Important new pension checks

Xerox Pensions pays pensions to more than 6,000 pensioners each month and, as part of its system for effective administration of the Xerox Pension Schemes, it will shortly be introducing new checks to verify that all these pensions are being paid correctly.

The verification process will be carried out on a rolling three-yearly basis, which means that, each year, a third of all pensioners who have been in receipt of a pension for more than one year will be sent a form setting out the personal details (name, address, National Insurance number etc) that Xerox Pensions currently holds on record for them. When you receive this form, you will be asked to check the details and then either confirm or, if necessary, amend them. The form must then be returned to Xerox Pensions – a pre-paid envelope will be provided.

Starting this year, these forms will be sent out in August. The first recipients will be pensioners whose surnames start with the letters A - F (with the exception of pensioners in receipt of an ill-health pension and child pensioners). Thereafter, other pensioners will receive a form either the following year or the year after that ... then the whole process will begin again.

We appreciate your co-operation with this new checking process. Please make sure that you deal with your form and return it as soon as possible to ensure that your pension payments are not interrupted.

Come and be a Visitor/contact for XPA

XPA was formed over 20 years ago and inevitably some of our original Visitors have decided to take a well-earned rest! So we are always glad to have volunteers. There is mutual support. Visitors are responsible to their Region Co-ordinator and have the opportunity to meet each other to discuss any concerns and compare notes.

We usually allocate no more than 25 pensioners to each Visitor. Our aim is to contact each pensioner twice a year – more if they are ill or have a problem. However, some pensioners don't require a visit – a telephone call to confirm they are all right may be sufficient. Any contact made is at the discretion of the Visitor, with the agreement of the visitee, with visits normally lasting not more than half-an-hour. We reimburse expenses for mileage, telephone, postage, etc.

Operation Turnaround succeeding

Since Operation Turnaround was announced in October 2000, a great deal has already been accomplished. Many of you will be aware of the major advertising push, particularly the Xerox sponsorship of the Winter Olympics. The Company was in profit by the fourth quarter 2001. In October 2001, **Anne Mulcahy**, Xerox President and Chief Executive Officer, announced another major step forward – the transfer of much of Xerox's manufacturing operations to Flextronics, resulting in a payment to Xerox of approximately \$220 million.

At that time, Anne Mulcahy also stated: "Although we are transferring a major part of our manufacturing capabilities, it is important for Xerox people to understand that we are keeping much of it as well. We will continue to manufacture high-end production printing and publishing equipment, toner and imaging supplies. We have a clear competitive advantage in these areas and will maintain them and continue to strengthen them."

Bill Goode retires – 31st December 2001

LOOKING BACK – the Company in the past

John Miell sent us his job-offer letter from when he joined the Company as a service engineer in 1963. He retired in 1992 after 29 years' service.

This snippet will probably jog other pensioners' memories!

... I am glad to confirm your engagement with the Company as a Service Engineer in the Midland Area, to take effect from 2nd September 1963.

Your commencing salary will be at the rate of £800 per annum, payable 4-weekly. ... Your normal hours of duty will be from 9.00 am to 5.30 pm and if required to remain after 6.30 pm overtime is payable from 5.30 pm at time and a quarter Monday to Friday.

When away overnight no overtime is payable, but an allowance of 30/- (£1.50) for bed and breakfast, plus 11/6 (65p) evening meal allowance will be given. On Saturdays and Sundays overtime is payable for all hours worked at time and a half, and in cases where you are required to stay overnight the above allowances are payable in addition.

Health watch

Food for thought from Health Consultant Ann Higgs

Like an engine, the human brain needs a balanced supply of fuel to perform at its best. Current research is now beginning to identify some of the key ingredients, and the results are quite surprising. For instance, did you know that:

- Drinking cranberry juice might help protect the brain from ageing?
- Regular helpings of fish may improve brain function?
- Greens could be instrumental in preventing dementia?
- Avocados and nuts might help slow neurodegenerative diseases?
- Soya consumption can assist transmission of messages within the brain?

With many exciting studies underway, the picture that is emerging is complex, but early results suggest some of these benefits may be gained from:

- Flavanoids a special type of antioxidant, abundant in many fruits and vegetables.
- Omega three fatty acids in oily fish, such as salmon, trout, mackerel and sardines.
- Folic acid abundant in fresh green vegetables, orange juice and the wheatgerm of wholemeal bread.
- Vitamin E-rich foods including blackberries, tomatoes, watercress, seeds, soft margarine and vegetable oils.
- Choline and other ingredients of soya lecithin.

This all serves to underline the importance of a good, balanced

diet, including as much

variety as possible.


Plenty of fresh fruits
