

Salt of the earth

Ann Higgs, our Health Consultant, writes

'Oh, I nearly forgot', says this week's favourite cooking programme presenter, 'Just add a pinch of salt'. How many times have we heard that, and does anyone ever ask why?

A naturally occurring mineral compound, sodium chloride, or common table salt, has been used in food preparation for centuries. It's proudly claimed that today's salt production industry in Cheshire can be traced back some 2000 years. Roman soldiers were sometimes paid partly in salt, which explains the derivation of the word salary.

Holding the balance

Present throughout the body, salt performs a number of essential tasks. The sodium helps regulate water balance and maintain heart rhythm. It's also instrumental in transporting nutrients through the bloodstream and in the conduction of nerve impulses to make the muscles work properly. The chloride plays an important role in digestion and the balancing of acidity levels.

Our kidneys control the amount of salt in the bloodstream and divert excess away via the bladder. We also lose salt when we perspire and through crying, so beware weepy films in overheated cinemas! Joking apart, although the body doesn't manufacture salt, it can easily, and very quickly, make good any deficit, obtaining plentiful supplies from food and drink. In fact, it's calculated that

a person ideally needs only about 1.25g a day - that's from all food and drink sources combined amounting to approximately half a

teaspoonful in total.

intake? There are several good reasons. One of the substantial risks associated with too much salt intake is high blood pressure.

now believed that a salt-rich diet may play a part in some forms of

established with coronary heart disease, kidney disease and stroke. What's more, it's stomach cancer.

Managing blood pressure

To lower blood

pressure, we can

consider reducing sodium intake, whilst making sure of getting enough magnesium, potassium and calcium. These beneficial minerals are plentiful in fresh vegetables, nuts, seeds and dairy products. It's also important that we balance our salt intake with plenty of water, either straight or perhaps perked up with a little fruit juice. It's believed that blood pressure can also be positively influenced through enjoyable physical activities and by taking time out to relax.

Whilst it's clear we probably don't need to add salt to our meals at the table, it's just as important that we enjoy our food. So, if taking the salt cellar is second nature, why not try filling it with a mix of salt and pepper? Even better, there are lots of tasty herbs and spices that can add flavour too. So, when someone next says, 'It's not worth its salt', just think, there might be a grain of truth in that!



Cases of salt deficiency in western society are rare since our typical modern diet is heavily laced with salt. Consequently, it's easy for us to consume more than we need. You see, manufacturers love it. A useful preservative, salt also has important flavour-enhancing properties, so it's used in many processed foods. Ready-made soups, salad dressings, savoury snacks, cooking sauces, stock cubes, canned meat and fish, all usually contain ample supplies of salt. It's there in butter, breakfast cereals, bacon, cheeses and pickled foods too and in breadmaking salt is necessary to control fermentation.



The Oz experience


An extract from Eric Setchell's travels with his wife.

We flew to Brisbane and picked up our hired camper van, equipped with a microwave, cooker, airconditioning, sink, fridge, toilet and shower as well as seats, a table and beds! Whilst it was possible to 'bush camp' for free, we wanted a certain amount of comfort and, therefore, paid to stay on approved caravan sites. It has to be said these sites were superb, far better than those we have experienced here in the UK.

But the lasting impression of Oz for us was the Aussie people. They could not have been friendlier or more helpful.

road told you how far the next roadhouse was, so it was impossible to run out of petrol. It was amusing to see a sign saying 'Emergency telephone 70 miles ahead'.



Pat Supple from Long Crendon writes:




Join the club

National Association of Swimming Clubs for the Handicapped

Harry Parker, who worked in the Supply Centre at Welwyn Garden City from 1974 to 1982, felt that there was a need for a swimming club for handicapped persons in the Stevenage area. He set about organising a club there and in July 1962 the inaugural meeting was held and the Dolphin Swimming Club for Handicapped Persons was formed.

The Swimming Pool in Stevenage was opened in October 1962 and the Dolphins were the first club to use it privately. There are now 170 members who meet every Sunday to enjoy the facilities and they are grateful to Stevenage Borough Council who allow their exclusive use.

In April 1965, Harry found other clubs nationally who were unaware of each other's existence. So, after 3 years' research, an inaugural meeting was arranged at Woburn Abbey (courtesy of His Grace the Duke of Bedford who attended the meeting), which resulted in the



formation of the above Association (NASCH). There are now over 100 clubs affiliated to the Association which has charitable status and covers the whole of Great Britain.

The objectives are:
To encourage, promote, and develop swimming for the physical and psychological benefit of handicapped persons.

The new Xerox business unit will combine the Tektronix industry-leading colour printing technologies with Xerox established line of colour and black-and-white workgroup printers to offer customers the broadest array of office printing products, available through a combined and proven worldwide distribution network.

XES wins British Telecom contract

Xerox Engineering Systems (XES) has developed scanning software that, for the first time ever, can distinguish hand-written material from underlying print or map, thus saving users significant time and cost. Scanned images can be stored on a document server or altered on screen.

The path-finding software enabled the company to secure more than \$1 million of business to supply British Telecom with document scanning and printing hardware. The equipment will be used to capture, separate and convert the ground and plant information to wide-format colour images for BT UK's telecommunications network, totalling in excess of five million documents.

The specialist software was initially developed to separate mapping information held on double-sided transparency, with plant diagrams overlaid on the reverse of ordnance survey maps. As well as transparencies, hardcopies are also held on paper and, in some cases, linen dating back almost 100 years. These will be scanned electronically and stored as digital images, to be retrieved as and when needed from a new digital based mapping system.

Life after Xerox



Eddie Barnes joined Rank Xerox in 1971 as a Paper Technologist, based at Welwyn Garden City. In 1977, with a complete change of direction, he moved to the UK Company, where he joined the front line copier salesforce. For most of the next twenty years, Eddie worked in Central London, based initially in Southwark

Street, then in Bury Street and, finally, in Albion House. Eddie may be best remembered as the man who went around his patch on a large silver BMW motorcycle – which is still going strong, with a quarter million miles on the clock! Eddie writes:





Bodelwyddan Castle Denbighshire – June 1999


Joe and Barbara Palacio write:


